

## **Pastoral Introduction**

Throughout your life, you've been a source of support for your family members and friends. This Funeral Planning Guide will help you support your loved ones at a time when they need it most. By documenting your funeral preferences, as well as other key information for your survivors, you can provide support posthumously – a final act of love.

Talking about death can be difficult. It is often painful and emotional. This booklet is designed to help you work through the process of planning and preparation in advance.

When completed, the booklet will provide your family with personal details and information, helpful notes, funeral service and burial / cremation wishes, and other information. With this information your family will know your personal wishes and be able to carry them out.

Funeral arrangements made in advance can help to lighten the family's burden. Such planning often spares loved ones from confusion, uncertainty, and concern over funeral and burial / cremation expenses.

It is important in considering your funeral wishes to be aware of the purposes of a funeral ceremony. There are 4 main purposes:

- I. To give the bereaved **comfort** and opportunity to reflect on and share their loss
- To acknowledge and give thanks for the life of the deceased in a truthful way and give thanks for that life in its richness and diversity. There person who has died will have meant different things to different people.
- 3. To ask the **safe transition** of the spirit / soul / character of the deceased into whatever is believed to lie beyond death
- 4. To give the bereaved inspiration and hope to resume their lives in the knowledge that things have irretrievably changed.

If you would like your funeral to have 'unconventional' elements, it may be best to talk these through with family and/or friends in advance. It is worth bearing in mind that a funeral ceremony is both for the deceased **and** for those who are left behind, and they will embrace a wide range of views and expectations.



# Typical Structure of a Funeral Ceremony

## Gathering

- the Funeral Celebrant welcomes everyone and 'sets the tone' of the ceremony. A Eulogy may also be given at this point

# Readings / Reflections

Particular readings, poems, music, other words are shared. A special action might happen at this point - Eg lighting of candles

# Time to recollect / remember / express hope

A time to give thanks for the departed, to express comfort for those who mourn, an opportunity to express a commitment to continue our own life's journeys in hope and trust (in religious ceremonies this section will usually be the prayers)

### Entrusting

The deceased's soul / spirit / character is released into the next part of the journey, whatever that is considered to be. For some people the releasing of balloons / doves has been an expression of release

#### Farewell

To say goodbye, committing the body for burial or cremation

To encourage
