Artist and author Jan Richardson calls this day “a threshold day in the rhythm of the Christian year.” It is the end of the season of Epiphany, an a-ha time filled with moments that spark clarity and understanding about who Jesus is and what he is doing. We are on the cusp of Lent, the season of discipline and prayer when we examine the human condition and the new possibilities offered to us in Jesus. While the Feast of Transfiguration is technically celebrated in August, this story falls on the Sunday before Lent every year. Rooted theologically between Jesus’ baptism and his resurrection, it is a wild and mystical story with lots of opportunity for reflection.

Today we are also observing “Shrove Tuesday” or “Fat Tuesday” and eating the traditional festive pancakes! This tradition is rooted in the practicalities of fasting during the 40 days of Lent, which begins on Ash Wednesday. Early Christians practiced a serious fast for the 40 days, abstaining from fat, meat, butter, sugar, and other rich ingredients. Thus, “Fat Tuesday” was the day that they used up the fat and other perishable rich foods that they would not eat during Lent. What better way to do this than pancakes?

The word “Shrove” comes from the Old English word “shriven,” meaning absolve, and it was a common practice for persons to go to confession the day before Ash Wednesday in preparation for the season of Lent. It has also been common on this day to burn the palms from the previous Palm Sunday to make ash for the Ash Wednesday service.

Thank you for joining us on this Threshold Day. May it be a time of epiphany, joy, sustenance, and connection such that we find the strength to enter the season of Lent open to the call of the Spirit.

SCRIPTURE

A reading from the Gospel of Matthew 17:1-9

Six days later, Jesus took with him Peter and James and his brother John and led them up a high mountain, by themselves. And he was transfigured before them, and his face shone like the sun, and his clothes became dazzling white. Suddenly there appeared to them Moses and Elijah, talking with him.
